Report from Week 1066: Pun for the Roses

In our 20th annual running of the Invitational's most popular recurring contest, we paraded a list of 100 of the 3-vear-old racehorses nominated for this weekend's Kentucky Derby and the rest of racing's Triple Crown, and asked readers to "breed" any two names to produce a "foal" whose name cleverly reflected those of the parents - as do the names of many real racehorses.

This year's field — totaling several thousand entries from more than 300 breeders - was perhaps the cleverest the Empress has seen in the 12 of these contests she's iudged. If your incredibly ingenious foal failed to get ink, it's not alone. Racing luck, you know? But you might be able to vary it slightly for this week's "grandfoal" contest.
