This week: **Reinterpret (or comment wryly on) a headline appearing in The Post (print or online) Sept. 17-28 by writing a bank head, or subtitle, as in the examples above from last Sunday’s Post.** In the print paper, you may use an article’s main headline, or a significant part of it (for example, everything before or after a colon); the story’s bank head; or the jump head, the headline on the story’s second page. Online, you may use not only headlines (or significant parts) above an article, but also headlines on the home page and elsewhere that serve as links to the article. And for both, you may use headlines in ads. See the Style Conversational column for further guidelines at [bit.ly/conv1141](http://bit.ly/conv1141).

Winner gets the Inkin’ Memorial, the Lincoln statue bobblehead that is the official Style Invitational trophy. 
